Fuseproject just announced an African accelerator with the Nike Foundation, USAID and DFID, supporting ventures that provide products and services that directly impact the lives of adolescent girls living in poverty worldwide over the next five years. It's a program I am immensely excited about, as it is the epitome of designing for social good.

# What's trending:

Technology is finally making a solid appearance in our homes, which is a new area that requires fresh thinking toward

discretion and more considered design. However, my hope is that, with the rise of technology, designers find ways to utilize it to enhance our interactions with each other, rather than distract us with more screens.

### For the architecture-obsessed:

There are projects built in the last 10 years that are must-sees: The de Young Museum by Herzog & de Meuron, the California Academy of Sciences by Renzo Piano, and the Contemporary Jewish Museum by Daniel Libeskind.

The exhibition of works by British artist Joseph Mallord William Turner—"J.M.W. Turner: Painting Set Free"—at the de Young Museum is going to be amazing.

Lisa Dolby Chadwick founded the Dolby Chadwick Gallery, which represents a roster of emerging and mid-career artists. The curator would love to splurge on a painting by German-born British painter Lucian Freud.
