M/Y LADY CANDY

The 56-meter super yacht Lady Candy was designed and built by the Italian shipbuilder Benetti with styling from Captain Paul Brackley's Central Yacht Design Studio. With her four decks, connected by a central lift, the exterior lines have a clearly contemporary and elegant feel.

The expert owner is from Asia and is a great enthusiast of the sea and diving. He played an active role in the yacht's design. The architects and designers worked closely together to develop a design object which was beyond the merely 'fashionable'.

The owner had a particularly strong impact on the interior layout which was custom-designed by Pamela Babey and the BAMO team from San Francisco.

M/Y Lady Candy combines interior spaces worthy of a 56-meter vessel with special performances, including a maximum speed of nearly 17 knots, and comfort which translates into stability, and almost zero vibrations and noise.

The owner explicitly requested that the interiors were given priority over the exteriors, creating an enormous main saloon that covered 88 m2 of the main deck. He also had his and his daughter's cabins moved to the upper deck to maximize privacy. The interiors had to be kept simple and welcoming. Briar root wood predominates and is combined with soft colors like lilac and jade, reflecting an 'international' aesthetic that unites the East and West. The upper deck of 'Lady Candy' is devoted to the owner and his daughter (after whom the boat is named) as well as other special guests. This is where the master and VIP suites are located. The VIP suite is to the bow and enjoys a marvelous water view thanks to the 180° circular window. The suite includes a dressing room, vanity, sofa, bathroom with double sinks, shower, and a bathtub. The owner's apartment is astern and includes a panoramic saloon, private office, lounge area, and large bathroom with two toilets separated by a shower. Forward of the


cabin is the private VIP terrace. "It must be like home. That was the client's directive. It sounded simple enough, but this was something different: a yacht. And not just any yacht, a super yacht", according to Pamela Babey, Founding Principal of the interior design firm BAMO and responsible for the vessel's interior design.

Although the Lady Candy was BAMO's first yacht, the clients were not new. Pamela and the BAMO team, which included Dorothy Greene, Alan Deal, Rhonda Lay, and Sara Young, had worked with the clients for years, designing several homes for them in Hong Kong. When he said, 'like home' I knew what he meant: 'like my home'. This was their private residence on The Peak in Hong Kong that started the collaboration.

Babey: "The perfect client is passionate, engaged, professional, and challenges me. These clients are all of these things. They also have great taste, have traveled the world, and are pleasant company."










